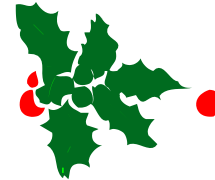

About Workplace Literacy and Basic Skills

Workplace Basic Skills are the core skills that employees need to do their jobs successfully. These skills are critical to the success of modern businesses.

Workplace basic skills include literacy skills and other important skills, attitudes and behaviors that are important to workplace success and better performance. Gaining basic skills also has a positive impact on employees' attitudes and behaviors. This is often just as valuable to employers as the skills gains themselves.

Workplace Basic Skills include:

- Understanding and ability to use prose such as reports, letters, and equipment manuals.
- Communicating effectively
- Understanding and ability to use documents such as safety instructions, assembly directions, maps.
- Understanding and ability to use numbers by themselves or charts and tables
- Thinking critically and acting logically to solve problems and make decisions
- Using computer, technology, tools and information systems effectively
- Ability to build and work in teams
- Positive attitude toward change
- Willingness and ability to learn for life

Recipe Corner

Wife Saver

9 slices bread, torn into bite size pieces

½ cup dice fresh mushrooms

½ cup chopped green pepper

16 oz Cheddar cheese, grated

½ cup chopped onion

2 cups cubed cooked ham

8 eggs

2 cups milk

Grease a 9x13 inch baking dish. Layer half the torn bread in the bottom. Sprinkle the mushrooms and green pepper over the bread layer. Sprinkle with half the cheese. Top with remaining bread, then layer with the onion and ham. Sprinkle with remaining cheese. Beat together eggs and milk; pour over mixture. Cover with aluminum foil, and refrigerate for 12 hours or so. Bake at 350 for 35 minutes. Remove foil and bake 15 minutes more.
