Literacy Facts:

- Today's jobs require highly literate workers – not just the ability to read and write well but thinking skills such as problem solving, decision making, critical thinking, and organizational skills.
- Literacy levels are connected to most of the pressing social and economic issues – unemployment, poverty, homelessness, health, rates of incarceration, social assistance, and child well being.
- A high school education is no guarantee that a person has the literacy skills she/he needs to succeed, but the lack of a high school education is a very strong indicator that she/he does not have the necessary skills.
- Learning doesn't end when we leave school – it is a lifelong process.
- Literacy levels influence the kind of jobs we'll get, the salaries we'll earn, or standard of living, the type of homes we'll live in, the type of education our children will receive and our ability to participate fully in our communities.

Recipe Corner

Three Cheese Chicken Bake

8 oz. Lasagna noodles, cooked and drained

½ c. chopped onions

½ c. chopped green pepper

3 T. butter

1 t. basil

16 oz. cottage cheese

1 can cream of chicken soup

6 oz. can sliced mushrooms, drained

½ c. milk

3 C. cooked, diced, chicken

2 C. shredded American cheese

½ C. grated Parmesan cheese

Sauté onion and green pepper in butter until tender. Stir in soup, mushrooms, milk and basil. Heat through.

Arrange half the lasagna in 9 x 13 pan. Top with ½ each sauce, cottage, American and Parmesan cheeses. Repeat with noodles, sauce, cottage cheese and chicken.

Bake at 350⁰ for 60 minutes. Top with remaining American and Parmesan cheese and bake for 3 minutes longer or until cheese on top melts. Let stand 15 minutes before serving.
